NWS Annual Severe Weather Spotter Training March 1

The National Weather Service (NWS) depends in part on eyewitness information from citizens, public safety and emergency management personnel trained to recognize and report potentially life-threatening severe weather conditions. NWS will lead a half-day seminar on March 1 at OSU, teaching over a 300 trainees how to spot, report, and prepare for tornadoes and other severe weather. FCEMHS is urging the community to participate in the annual Statewide Tornado Drill at 9:50 a.m. on Wednesday, March 5, when the Franklin County Outdoor Warning Siren system will be activated for a longer tone (three minutes) than in the regular Wednesday noon tests. Designing and exercising a tornado safety plan for your home or establishment will help you respond safely in a real event. FCEM&HS is reaching out directly to more than 1,800 area schools, businesses and agencies to urge them to participate in the statewide tornado drill March 5 and complete an <u>online survey</u> about their participation.
